## ABOUT BTO YOUTH

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BTO Youth is the youth branch of the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). BTO is a UK charity focusing on understanding birds and, in particular, how and why bird populations are changing. Our vision is of a world where people are inspired by birds and informed by science. Our Youth programme aims to engage young people with nature and science in a safe, inclusive and accessible way.



## WHY JOIN CAMP?

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Our Bird Camps are a great way to get started on your journey with birdwatching, or to develop your skills if you are already a budding ornithologist. You will meet a group of like-minded young people with an interest in nature, birds and science, and you will meet a range of staff and volunteers from the BTO and our partners. Our camp programme includes lots of different activities, focusing (of course!) on birds, but also on art, mindfulness, and answering scientific questions.



## THE CAMPS

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BTO runs three Bird Camps: one in Northern Ireland (24–26 May), England (28–30 June) and Wales (19–21 July). In Scotland we are working in partnership with our friends at the Scottish Ornithologists' Club for a fourth in East Lothian (31 May–2 June). Camps run from Friday evening to Sunday evening and are all-inclusive. We also provide transport options, and we can help with equipment if you don't have everything.

Each of the camps will follow a similar itinerary, although this will vary based on location and the weather. A more detailed itinerary will be shared with successful camp applicants closer to the time.

### Friday:

(Late afternoon) Arrival at camp, getting to know each other, health & safety, evening activity and introduction to our arts activity.

### Saturday:

Day-trip to local nature reserve(s), learning about BTO surveys and bird identification, mindfulness, creative workshop, evening activity (e.g. campfire, looking for bats or stargazing).

### Sunday:

Ringling demo (weather-permitting), learning to identify birds by song, final presentations & pledges.

## HOW TO APPLY

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Just follow the instructions on the online application form! If you need any help with your application, email us, or join one of our Q&A sessions. We'll ask you why you want to come to camp, what you hope to learn, and to tell us a bit about your favourite green space, plant or animal. **Note that you can't save progress on the form, so make sure you've got your answers ready.**

## WHO CAN CAMP?

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Our camps are open to young people, resident in the UK, who are:

- At the time of camp, in secondary school or college and **under 18 years old**
- Enthusiastic about nature (but you do **not** have to be an expert!)

## COST + EQUIPMENT

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All Bird Camps are completely **free** of charge. We do this because it is important to us to make our camps accessible to any young person. However, if you are financially able to support us in running our camps, we always welcome donations.

You will receive a full packing list before going on camp, but a key piece of equipment for Bird Camp is binoculars. If you don't have a pair, let us know in your application so we can lend you some, or you can apply for our Equipment Donation Scheme ([www.bto.org/equipment](http://www.bto.org/equipment)). If you apply, let us know which Bird Camp you're attending.

## GETTING TO CAMP

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Our camps take place near nature reserves and green spaces, and may not be accessible by public transport. To help you get there, we'll be organising pick-ups from different cities near the camp, but you can also be dropped off directly at camp if you prefer, just let us know in your application form.

## ACCOMMODATION

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Accommodation at all camps will be shared in indoor dormitories. Staff are fully DBS-checked (through Disclosure Scotland and AccessNI in Scotland and Northern Ireland, respectively) and trained in safeguarding, and they will always be on site overnight and available to the campers.

# SAFEGUARDING

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Safeguarding participants is of paramount importance to us. All of our staff and volunteers have completed safeguarding training and will be DBS checked and cleared. A Designated Safeguarding Lead will be present at each camp. BTO's Safeguarding Policy can be found on our website or by email our team at [youth@bto.org](mailto:youth@bto.org). We will also provide a full risk assessment before the start of camp, including a COVID-19 risk assessment taking into consideration the most current advice from Government.

# ACCESSIBILITY



# INCLUSIVITY

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We want our camps to be a safe space for all participants, and so we ask everyone to abide by our Code of Conduct which will be shared in advance. **You do not need to be an experienced "birder"** or have spent lots of time in nature to apply; we will create a balanced group of experienced and newer naturalists and birdwatchers. We especially welcome applications from young people from underrepresented groups.
